

In the fateful year of 1945, amidst the echoes of a world at war, Wesley United Methodist Church emerged as a beacon of hope and community in Phoenix, Arizona. It was a time when the indomitable Chaplain Allen L. Johnson, a decorated veteran and stalwart of the Army's 92nd Infantry Division, answered a divine call to nurture a new congregation.

Under Chaplain Johnson's visionary leadership, Wesley Episcopal Church was officially born on December 23, 1945, with a modest yet steadfast assembly of ten pioneers. Their names echoed through the corridors of history: D. F. Benson, Emma Gardner, O'Neal Gross, R. G. Johnson, Hattie Scott, Walter Scott, N. E. Swinton, Rosa Swinton, Grace Towns, and John W. McClinton.

From these humble beginnings sprang forth a flourishing community. By February 1946, the membership had swelled to 29, prompting the acquisition of larger quarters and the inauguration of morning services. Such was the irresistible momentum of faith and fellowship that by June 1946, 38 souls had found sanctuary within Wesley's nurturing embrace.

The inaugural year of Wesley witnessed milestones that resonated far beyond its walls. In December 1946, the congregation celebrated its first anniversary by moving into a bespoke sanctuary, a refurbished dwelling pulsating with the fervor of its burgeoning community. By year's end in 1947, the membership had burgeoned to 90, testament to the steadfast commitment and unwavering resolve of its faithful.

As Wesley's footprint expanded, so too did its ambitions. The pivotal gift of a prime property at East Washington and North 18th Streets by the Conference Board of Missions ignited ambitious plans for a new edifice. A fundraising campaign, marked by the purchase of every brick with hopeful contributions, epitomized the collective spirit propelling Wesley forward.

On April 9, 1948, sealed bids heralded the dawn of construction for the grand Wesley Church, embodying the dreams and aspirations of its community. Guided by Reverend Allen L. Johnson and an illustrious roster of leaders, including W. B. Scott, Bishop Martin, and Morris Ward, Wesley's steadfast journey continued to unfold.

The passing years ushered new chapters and custodians of Wesley's sacred mission. Reverends T. R. Albert, William H. Stevens, Charles F. Harlins, Rollins Winslow, and Ennis Whaley each left an indelible mark, enriching the tapestry of Wesley's narrative with their visionary stewardship and unwavering commitment.



Under Reverend Whaley's auspices, the dawn of a new sanctuary on East Southern marked a watershed moment, a testament to Wesley's enduring spirit and burgeoning influence. The installation of stained glass windows in May 1970 illuminated Wesley's commitment to spiritual splendor and community enrichment.

Reverend Richard Joseph Parker's tenure brought renewed collaboration and fellowship, epitomized by combined worship services with neighboring congregations. Reverend Emory Taylor's stewardship further expanded Wesley's reach through innovative community projects and cultural endeavors, culminating in a memorable Bicentennial celebration in 1976.

Throughout the decades, Wesley United Methodist Church remained steadfast in its commitment to spiritual growth and community service. Under the visionary leadership of Reverends Franklin Jamison, Dennis Hutson, Harold Palmer, and Alexander M. Mason, Wesley continued to evolve, embracing new generations and innovative programs that nurtured faith, fellowship, and cultural enrichment.

Today, Wesley United Methodist Church stands as a testament to resilience and community spirit, a sanctuary where generations past, present, and future find solace, strength, and inspiration amidst the ebbs and flows of life's journey.
